# This Week in Review

# **Capital Budget**

The biggest—and most positive—news of the session arrived yesterday. After 12 (almost 13) months of struggling to successfully hammer out a compromise to fix the *Hirst* decision, legislators yesterday afternoon publicly announced they had reached a deal. The Supreme Court's 2016 *Hirst* ruling changed how counties decide to approve or deny building permits that use wells for a water source. Prior to the decision, counties would rely on assistance and data provided by the Washington State Department of Ecology. *Hirst*, however, requires counties to independently verify the availability of water. Because many counties do not have the personnel or funding to make the necessary decisions about wells, they have issued temporary laws restricting building that relies on groundwater wells.

Although *Hirst* has no real, direct impact on K–12 education, fixing the issue became crucial to the education community because Senate Republicans in the Legislature linked the issue to the 2017–19 Capital Budget, a budget which includes \$1.0 billion in school construction assistance. Republicans argued, "if families can't build homes, we won't allow the state to build either." Republicans in the majority last session simply refused to bring the Capital Budget to a vote in the Senate. In 2018, Democrats are in the majority in the Senate, and due to their majority, they control the agenda and the Floor Calendar. The problem, however, is that the bond bill to actually fund the 2017–19 Capital Budget requires a 60 percent supermajority vote of both houses to be adopted. So, even in the minority, Republicans held all the leverage on a *Hirst* fix.

During the first two weeks of session, there were multiple rumors on top of rumors that a *Hirst* compromise was imminent. We heard a deal was struck in the Senate, but was not supported by the House. Then we heard the House had a deal, but before both houses could confer and agree, the agreement fell apart. We heard the Senate was preparing to run the Capital Budget, both the bill and the bonds, without a *Hirst* bill in-hand, hoping to force the Republicans' to cave or be embarrassed, but the threat was never acted upon. Finally, on Tuesday, negotiators reached a deal "in principle," but the agreement was delicate and could have collapsed without warning. Ultimately, negotiators briefed their respective caucuses and the deal held firm, allowing a public announcement yesterday. The vehicle for action is **SB 6091**.

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With a *Hirst* fix nearly in place, the Capital Budget moved to the Floor in both houses. The House version of the budget bill and bond bill, HB 1075 and HB 1080, respectively, were adopted by the House Capital Budget Committee on the second day of this session and moved to Second Reading of the House Floor Calendar on the third day of session. After the *Hirst* deal was announced, the House immediately moved on the bond bill, HB 1080, adopting it with a 94-2 vote. Similar action occurred in the Senate. Their version of the budget bill and bond bill, SB 6090 and SB 6089, respectively, were heard in the Senate Ways & Means Committee at the end of last week, adopted by the Committee on Monday and moved to Second Reading of the Senate Floor Calendar on Tuesday.

In recent years, both houses have tried to avoid evening sessions; however, both the House and Senate scheduled evening action last night to quickly act on the *Hirst* bill, the Capital Budget, and the necessary bond bill. After lengthy caucus meetings in both houses, the Senate adopted the long-awaited *Hirst* fix, SB 6091 with a vote of 35-14. then moved to adopt the Capital Budget bond bill, HB 1080 (which the House had already approved), with a vote of 47-2, and finally adopted the full 2017–19 Capital Budget, SB 6090, with unanimous consent.

SB 6091 and SB 6090 were immediately transmitted to the House, where they promptly acted. SB 6091 was adopted with a vote of 66-30 and SB 6090 was adopted with a vote of 95-1. After a long, winding road, all three bills (SB 6091, SB 6090, and HB 1080) were sent to the governor's desk for his action. He is expected to promptly sign each bill (earlier in the day he publicly gave his commitment to sign the *Hirst* compromise).

The final 2017–19 Capital Budget, (SB 6090) is substantially similar to the compromise version of **SB 5981** which was negotiated and agreed upon last session. The bill appropriates \$4.2 billion for capital construction across the state. It is funded with \$2.72 billion in bonds and another \$1.43 billion from other sources. K–12 education is provided with a total appropriation of \$1.03 billion, with \$933 million going to the School Construction Assistance Program (SCAP)—\$1.0 million of the SCAP appropriation must be used for study and survey grants and for completing inventory and building condition assessments for public school districts every six years. Additional details follow:

- \$35.0 million is appropriated for Small Rural District Modernization Grants to assist small, rural school districts with total enrollments of one thousand students or less, with school facilities with significant building system deficiencies, and with such low property values that replacing or modernizing the school facility through SCAP would present an extraordinary tax burden on property owners or would exceed allowable debt for the district. \$11.2 million of the appropriation is provided for projects in small rural districts where the school facility does not need to be replaced or require an extensive modernization, but does have significant building system deficiencies. \$23.8 million of the appropriation is provided for projects at three specific school districts: Mount Adams (\$14.3 million), South Bend (\$7.7 million), and Lopez Island (\$1.8 million).
- \$21.2 million is provided to support specific distressed schools' projects. \$19.6 million of the appropriation is provided for Seattle School District to address challenges related to extraordinary growth and to maintain and repair existing buildings. An additional \$500,000 is provided for maintenance to improve the health and environment for students and staff at the Eckstein Middle School in Seattle. \$1.1 million is provided for the Black Diamond Elementary School in the Enumclaw School District.
- \$13.0 million is provided for STEM Classrooms and Labs. \$2.8 million of the appropriation is specifically provided for the Federal Way School District to merge STEM facilities. \$200,000 of the appropriation must be used for a contract with the STEM Education Innovation Alliance. The remaining funding is

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- provided to OSPI to provide STEM classrooms and labs grants to school districts for public school facilities serving students in grades nine through twelve, to construct classrooms, or labs, as additions to existing school buildings or to modernize specialized STEM facilities.
- \$10.8 million is appropriated for core growth at the Tri-Tech Skills Center. A portion of the funds must be used for a budget evaluation study, using a budget evaluation study team incorporating value engineering techniques.
- \$6.0 million is provided for K-12 construction grants:
  - \$2.0 million of the appropriation is provided for Emergency Repair Grants to address unexpected and imminent health and safety hazards at K-12 public schools, including Skills Centers.
  - \$3.0 million is provided for Urgent Repair Grants to address nonreoccurring urgent small repair projects at K-12 public schools, excluding Skills Centers, that could impact the health and safety of students and staff if not completed. Grants can be used for: repair or replacement of failing building systems; abatement of potentially hazardous materials; and safety-related structural improvements.
  - \$1.0 million is provided for Equal Access Grants for facility repairs and alterations at K-12 public schools, including Skills Centers, to improve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
- \$3.6 million is provided to OSPI for administration of the Capital Projects Program.
- \$3.3 million is provided for Healthy Kids/Health Schools grants to support projects that are consistent with the Healthiest Next Generation priorities. \$1.0 million of the appropriation may be used for the replacement of leadcontaminated drinking water fixtures; \$1.0 million may be used to purchase equipment or make repairs related to improving children's physical health. including fitness playground equipment, covered play areas, and physical education equipment or related structures or renovation; and \$250,000 may be used to purchase equipment or make repairs related to improving children's awareness and participation in sustaining efficient schools and may include dashboards that display energy savings, composting systems, and recycling stations. Remaining funds may be provided to purchase equipment or make repairs related to improving children's nutrition, including garden-related structures and greenhouses to provide students access to fresh produce, and kitchen equipment or upgrades.
- \$3.0 million is provided for minor works projects at Skills Centers.
- \$2.0 million is appropriated to support the Everett Pathways to Medical Education.
- \$1.8 million is appropriated for an Agriculture Science in Schools Grant to the FFA Foundation.
- \$1.0 million is provided for Career & Technical Education Equipment Grants. \$72,000 of the appropriation is provided for the Bellevue School District for CTE equipment; \$50,000 is provided for the Issaguah School District for CTE equipment; and \$30,000 is provided for the Elma School District for CTE equipment. The remainder of the appropriation is provided to OSPI to provide CTE equipment grants to school districts.

The Capital Budget also establishes a Joint Legislative Task Force on Improving State Funding for School Construction. Proviso language establishes a series of issues the Task

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Force must address and requires a final report with recommendations to be completed by October 1, 2018.

# **High School Assessments**

Last session, the issue of High School graduation requirements was hotly debated. Multiple bills were introduced that took several different approaches to graduation requirements. A bill to fully decouple (or "de-link") English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Biology assessments from the graduation requirement and a bill to simply delay the Biology assessment rose to the top of the list. Near the end of the Second Special Session, State Superintendent Reykdal proposed a "third way." The compromise bill, ESHB 2224, passed both houses with no dissenting votes. Among other things, the bill delayed the Biology/Science assessment until 2021; and allows students who fail to meet standard on the ELA and/or Mathematics assessment to appeal to have the requirements waived.

Reaching consensus on ESHB 2224 took the full Regular Session and most of two Special Sessions, but the debate rages on. While the compromise on assessments was adopted without any 'no' votes, many supporting legislators did not believe the bill went far enough. Three bills to fully de-link each of the high school assessments from graduation are currently in play this session: HB 2621, SB 6144, and HB 1046.

HB 2621, heard on Monday in the House Education Committee, would eliminate the requirement for students to earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement (CAA) or Certificate of Individual Achievement (CIA) by meeting the state standard on assessments. The bill would also eliminate alternative assessment options for students who have not met standard on statewide assessments. Even though the assessments would be delinked from graduation, OSPI and the State Board of Education would still be required to maintain and revise a statewide assessment system for students in the content areas of reading, writing, mathematics, and science.

SB 6144 is similar to HB 2621, but not identical. SB 6144 was heard on Monday in the Senate Early Learning & K–12 Education Committee. The bill would maintain the current requirement for school districts to administer the state assessments in English Language Arts (ELA), mathematics, and science as required by the federal law; however, it would eliminate the requirement for high school students to meet the state proficiency standard on the high school assessment to earn a Certificate of Academic Achievement (CAA) and graduate from high school.

Testimony on both bills in both Committees was overwhelmingly supportive. The only voices in opposition came from the League of Education Voters, Stand for Children, and Washington Roundtable.

The main de-link bill from last session, HB 1046, awaits action on the House's Floor Calendar. It appears likely that HB 1046, which passed the full House 92-6 last year. will be the House's vehicle for assessments. A striking amendment with language from HB 2621 is on the bar ready to be laid on top of the current HB 1046.

## EHB 2242 Fixes

On Monday, January 22, 2018, the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee is scheduled to hold a public hearing on the OSPI (SB 6362) and WEA (SB 6397) bills to "fix" EHB 2242. Also on the agenda will be one of the LAP flexibility bills (SB 6394). With the education community's heavy focus on amending EHB 2242, we are pleased we have an early opportunity to address our concerns about the Legislature's McCleary Plan.

While we expect individual school district superintendents and other administrators (along with board members, teachers, principals, and others) to focus on a few specific issues addressed in the bills, speaking on behalf of the association WASA will

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be providing some broad, high-level comments based on the WASA Platform. We will urge the Legislature to:

- increase per-student special education funding, via the excess cost multiplier;
- reinstate a simplified mandatory state salary schedule and allocation model that includes a staff mix factor (some type of "experience factor") to ensure consistency, uniformity, and equity across the state;
- delay implementation of new levy and LEA policy until a more workable and equitable levy reduction plan can be developed; and
- reconsider EHB 2242's regionalization calculation methodology and application.

We know we will have limited time to talk; however, given enough time, we will also address the need for: a delay in the K-3 class size compliance; additional flexibility in LAP and other categorical funding; the repeal of EHB 2242's unworkable salary cap for Certificated Administrative Staff; and a workable "hold harmless" provision.

# AEA

Good news for the 2017-19 Capital Budget! Last night, both houses passed SSB 6090, the 2017–19 Capital Budget, SHB 1080, the bond bill to help fund the capital budget, and SSB 6091, availability of water, which is the Legislature's response to the 2016 Hirst Supreme Court decision. Now all three bills go to the Governor for his signature.

As we discussed in last week's TWIO. AEA is pleased that three specific measures are found in SSB 6090, including, (1) the **Urgent School Repair Grant**, which would be coordinated by OSPI with consultation from WAMOA; (2) the Healthy Kids/Healthy Schools Grant, which would fund the replacement of lead-contaminated drinking water fixtures, physical education equipment and kitchen equipment. Also, WAMOA and Department of Health would consult with OSPI on this grant process; and (3) the establishment of a Joint Legislative Task Force on Improving School Construction Funding.

SHB 1080 provides \$2.93 billion in state general obligation bonds to finance projects in SSB 6090. It also contains a provision, which was part of the water rights solution, that authorizes \$300 million in state general obligation bonds for the Watershed Fisheries Restoration and Enhancement Program. These bond proceeds will be phased in over a period of 15 years at \$20 million per year.

WSNA was busy this week watching the progress of the two breakfast-after-the-bell bills. SB 6003, sponsored by Sen. Lisa Wellman (D-Mercer Island) moved without amendments to Senate Rules on Monday, 2ESHB 1508, sponsored by Rep. Monica Stonier (D-Vancouver), will have a public hearing on Wednesday, January 24, 2018.

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# Pensions/Health Benefits

While there have been some new bills introduced, the attention now focuses on holding hearings, and moving bills out of committees into each house's respective Rules' Committee, and then onto the respective floor for action. Both houses are holding hearings on some identical bills. Traditionally one chamber ends up with the version that advances but those decisions have yet to be made in some cases. But the key is movement.

Last week's report covered the proposals in more detail. This is just a guick look at the bill and any action since the last report.

# **Pension Related Proposals**

# **Cost of Living Adjustments:**

Retiree groups have not had any cost of living (COLA) raise in their retirement benefit since the COLA was taken away in 2011. In addition, the health care subsidy paid by the state was reduced and then frozen since 2011.

The Senate Ways & Means Committee has scheduled a hearing January 23 at 3:30 p.m. to hear the various bills proposed to address this matter.

SB 6290 – would grant a one-time 3% COLA for all Plan 1 members. (Its companion bill HB 2323 has had no movement beyond its initial introduction.)

SB 6305 – would grant a one-time 3% COLA on the first \$25,000 of pension to a maximum of a \$750 increase. It would also cap the cost of insurance for retiree to no more than 50% of the premium. (Its companion bill, HB 2452 has had not movement beyond its initial introduction.)

SB 6340 – would grant a one-time 3% COLA on the first \$25,000 of pension to a maximum of a \$750 increase. This is agency request legislation from the Select Committee on Pension Policy which voted 13-2 to request legislative action. Its companion, HB 2511. is scheduled to be heard before the House Appropriations Committee on January 22 at 3:30 p.m.

## **Retirement Plan Default:**

HB 1560 – would change the present retirement plan default for new hires from Plan 3 to Plan 2. It was heard by the House Appropriations Committee on January 17 and scheduled for Executive Action on January 18.

## **Substitute Options for early Retirees:**

On January 16, the Senate Ways & Means Committee had a public hearing for testimony on three bills that could expand the potential opportunities for early retirees to work in school districts. School district personnel, WEA and WSSRA testified in support of these measures.

To date, the only bill to advance is **SB 5310**: Authorizes a teacher in Plan 2 or 3 who retired under alternate early retirement provisions to be employed exclusively as a coach.

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It is scheduled for Executive Action by the Senate Ways & Means Committee on January 24 at 3:30 p.m.

These bills have seen no further movement since the public hearing: <u>HB 1685/SSB 5487</u>: Allows retired principals or teachers to return as teacher mentors or advisors in teacher preparation programs. <u>HB 5601</u>: In addition to returning to work as a substitute teacher in an instructional capacity, a retired teacher who retired under an early retirement option may be employed in an administrative or supervisory capacity without suspension of pension benefits.

HB 2379 – would allow retired classified employees to return to work under the same restrictions as currently in place for using retirees. Additional retirees and jobs that would be allowed include, for example, bus drivers, paraprofessionals, OT's, PT's, and others. A public hearing has been scheduled before the House Appropriations Committee January 24 at 3:30 p.m. There has been no movement on the companion bill, SB 6289.

<u>SB 6185</u> – which would delete the original sunset date for use of retiree as substitutes. (August 1, 2020) has had no further movement beyond introduction.

School district business officials should spend some time reading the following bills to see if there are fiscal impacts on their individual district and practices. They all concern pending changes in benefit plans and compensation.

# School Employee Benefit Board (SEBB) Health Related Proposals

HB 2438/SB 6241 – This bill is a 'clean up' bill requested by the Health Care Authority that just makes the intent and provisions of the original legislation clearer. The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the House Appropriations Committee January 25 at 3:30 p.m.; The Senate bill is scheduled before the Ways & Means Committee January 24 at 3:30 p.m.

<u>HB 2655/SB 6286</u> – would add one member nominated by the Washington State School Directors' Association and one member from the Washington Association of School Administrators to the SEBB Board.

The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the House Appropriations Committee January 25 at 3:30 p.m.; The Senate bill is scheduled before the Ways & Means Committee January 24 at 3:30 p.m.

HB 2657/SB 6288 – would make substantive changes in the original proposal including allowing districts to have their own insurance pool and cover more benefits than currently allowed in the original legislation.

The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the House Appropriations Committee January 25 at 3:30 p.m.; The Senate bill is scheduled before the Ways & Means Committee January 24 at 3:30 p.m.

# Family and Medical Leave

HB 2702/SB 6338 – makes technical corrections requested by the Employment Security Department in the Family and Medical Leave Act passed last session.

The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the House Labor & Workplace Standards Committee January 22 at 1:30 p.m.; The Senate bill was scheduled before the Labor & Commerce Committee January 17 at 1:30 p.m.

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# Other

**SB 6210** – relates to the terms under which tribal schools may participate in the state retirement systems as part of a state-tribal education compact. It has been scheduled for a public hearing before the Senate Ways & Means Committee on January 23 at 3:30 p.m. The companion bill, **HB 2490**, has not moved since introduction.

HB 2703/SB 6339 – modifies the employment security act to clarify the hours and wages for education employee compensation claims.

The House bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the House Labor & Workplace Standards Committee January 22 at 1:30 p.m.; The Senate bill was scheduled before the Labor & Commerce Committee January 17 at 1:30 p.m.

SB 6192 - requires each contract year or equivalent of full-time employment in a certificated or classified position with a school district within the state to be credited to the state officer or employee as one year of qualifying service, to the extent that rates of vacation leave accrual are based upon total state employment.

This bill is scheduled for a public hearing before the Senate State Government, Tribal Relations & Elections Committee January 24 at 8:00 a.m. and scheduled for Executive Session January 26 at 8:00 a.m.
