Dear Friends and Colleagues,

On March 10, the Legislature adjourned its 2022 Regular Session, Sine Die. The session yielded a number of substantive and positive outcomes for K–12. WASA was able to exert influence to redirect or stop legislation that was problematic or even destructive to public schools. Assistant Executive Director Dan Steele is a visible and respected presence with legislators. But most importantly, WASA members were engaged and active prior to and throughout the session. In fact, **your** voice and subsequent impact was stronger than ever in 2022. Thanks to you, good things were realized for schools and for kids.

Here at WASA, we have already initiated preliminary work to identify legislative priorities for 2023. Another essential element of this work is to establish and strengthen relationships with lawmakers. The time **outside** of session is the best occasion to make these connections with legislators. To that end, I’d ask you to consider reaching out NOW. Invite legislators to meet with your board, leadership team, and/or students to thank them for their work last session. Get them into your schools this spring to see and experience the great work occurring there. Building relationships and telling your district’s story is best done over time, well in advance of the 2023 session. Also, be reminded this is an election year. Legislators will likely be more responsive to your invitation to engage this spring and next fall.

Engaging with legislators is similar to Coach Price’s view on recruiting great high school football players. To do it most effectively, making connections is a year-round effort. I hope you will carve out a bit of time this spring and again next fall to establish or strengthen your relationship with legislators. Laying a solid foundation in this regard will pay dividends as the 2023 session gets rolling next January. Your individual and collective voice can and will make a difference for your schools and the students in them—especially if you seize the opportunity to start this important work today.

## LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

The Legislature adjourned its 2022 Session on March 10, after successfully adopting the largest Supplemental Operating and Supplemental Capital Budgets in state history, along with a slew of policy bills. K–12 education achieved several major successes, including enhanced staffing ratios in the Prototypical School Funding Model. A long-time priority for WASA, funding is provided to begin a three-year phase-in of additional state-funded staff allocations for physical, social, and emotional support staff (such as nurses, counselors, social workers, etc.). This initial step to increasing staffing ratios to a more realistic level is the most positive outcome of the session; however, we will use this as a launching pad to continue pressing for needed enhancements across the Model in 2023 and beyond. Additional big wins include funding for Enrollment Stabilization; providing additional financial support for 230 school districts that continue to deal with student enrollment declines; and pupil transportation funding to assist districts transporting special passengers. This funding will serve as a jump-start as we advocate for a more comprehensive overhaul of the current STARS funding formula next session.

Although administrators successfully advocated for some big ticket items in the budget, there were also disappointments. Perhaps the greatest disappointment is the Supplemental Operating Budget's net reduction in education funding, even though the Legislature had a significant and historic budget surplus of more than \$12.0 billion. As the Legislature attempted to comply with the Supreme Court's McCleary decision in the 2017–2019 biennium, K–12 funding rose to encompass 52 percent of the state's Operating Budget. Following the adoption of the 2022 Supplemental Operating Budget, K–12's percentage of the overall budget plummeted to 43 percent. Normally, this would simply mean that other areas of government are increasing funding at a greater rate than K–12; however, this year, K–12 funding actually went down. Administrators have our work cut out for us in the coming years as we continue to advocate for needed supports for our students, staff, and programs.

There are other budget details and many, many bills adopted this session that will impact school districts. WASA staff are in the process of producing our annual End of Session Report, which will include full details of the 2022 Supplemental Operating and Capital Budgets, along with a comprehensive review of the many education-related bills the Legislature addressed this session.
