# WASA Recognizes Outstanding Educational Leaders at the 2021 WASA/AWSP Summer Conference

Washington state educators celebrate successes, focus on leadership, equity, andopportunity for our state's students

**OLYMPIA**— Nearly 600 school superintendents, central office administrators, and principals from across Washington state took part in virtual online workshops at the 41st annual Washington Association of School Administrators (WASA) and Association of Washington School Principals' (AWSP) Summer Conference. The theme of this year's conference, "Junetastic," focused on three leadership themes: Instructional Practice, Social Emotional Learning (SEL) for Staff and Students, and Equity.

Keynote speakers and breakout sessions addressed topics such as leadership development, equity, leading restorative practices, effective school mental health, and meeting the needs of all students. The event also played host to WASA's 2021 End of the Year Celebration, where WASA state-level awards, the Piper Sandler Doyle E. Winter Scholarship for Administrative Leadership in Education, and the PEMCO Robert J. Handy Most Effective Administrator awards were also presented.

"The WASA awards program highlights exemplary examples of leadership, trust, and advocacy

for students and for public education," said WASA Executive Director Joel Aune. "For the past 15 months, school district leaders have been under intense pressure as the pandemic threw families, students, and schools into chaos. Their leadership, coupled with incredible instances of support from community leaders, kept the focus on students and their well-being," he added.

"This year's award recipients serve as a model for leadership and selfless service to the children and young people attending our schools," he continued. "On behalf of WASA and school district leaders across the entire State of Washington, I congratulate this year's award recipients. We are indebted to their extraordinary service, support, and leadership — for kids. During the most difficult of circumstances, they stepped up in a big way."

Piper Sandler Doyle E. Winter Scholarship for Administrative Leadership in Education The 2021 Doyle E. Winter Scholarship for Administrative Leadership in Education was presented to Cindy Rockholt, Assistant Superintendent Educator Growth and Development; Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI).

The Doyle E. Winter Scholarship is designed to assist talented and committed educational administrators as they enhance those skills needed to serve as educational leaders in the field of public education. The scholarship was established in honor of Dr. Doyle Winter, who retired in 2002 after completing 44 years of service for Washington public schools. Winter is a former executive director of WASA and has been recognized repeatedly for exhibiting exemplary leadership ability and enhancing school administration throughout his career.

# PEMCO Robert J. Handy Most Effective Administrator Awards

The Robert J. Handy Most Effective Administrator Awards, sponsored by PEMCO Insurance and WASA, seek to recognize outstanding public-school administrators in the state of Washington. One highly effective superintendent, central office administrator, or building administrator is selected from a small school district (up to 500 students), medium-size school district (501–2,000 students), and large school district (over 2,000 students). A \$10,500 award is equally divided among the three winners. A peer committee selects the recipients from nominations that describe how each nominee is taking part in realizing the nine characteristics of high-performing schools/districts as defined by research from the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction.
